One of Japan's First Exchange Students: Taro Kusakabe



- In 1870, Fukui's own Taro Kusakabe graduated from Rutgers College in New Jersey, making him one of the first Japanese exchange students ever to graduate from an American college.
- Kusakabe-san was followed by hundreds of Japanese students who pursued education in the United States during the Meiji Period, and many, many more thereafter.








decreasing in recent years




Open Doors 2010 International Student Enrollment at U.S. Universities



- Encourage more companies to fund study in the U.S. for current employees
- Encourage alumni of U.S. universities to speak to potential students and their parents about the value of U.S. education



Domestic Employment Competition 就職活動

- Students miss junior year job search
- Loss of optimism concerning value of exchange experience
- Disconnect between employers' expectations and student concerns



Summer & Short-Term Programs





- Programs last from a few weeks up to three months
- Some Japanese universities offer summer and shortterm programs with U.S. institutions.
- Consider extracurricular, sports, & cultural exchange programs in the United States!

Overcoming the Employment Challenge 就職難を克服するには

- Encourage students to study abroad earlier
- Many employers highly value abroad experience
- 英語公用語化 "English as official language"



 Push employers to publicly speak out for candidates with experience abroad

Create Employment Opportunities 就職活動の支援

- Organize career fairs for students abroad

 - Los Angeles Career Forum 2010: October 22-24
- Create employment database emphasizing experience abroad
